
Better Tuition Finding and Correcting Spelling and Punctuation Errors Workbook

Introduction

This workbook aims to help your Key Stage 2 child develop her/ his proof reading ability. The tests encourage children to develop greater attention to detail whilst improving their understanding of spelling and punctuation rules.

Tips for finding and correcting spelling and punctuation errors

1. Each test has eight sentences, six of which contain one error. Your child must identify the six mistakes as well as the two sentences which contain no errors.
2. It is not helpful to complete several tests at once. We recommend that your child should complete one spelling and one punctuation test per session.
3. Ask your child to read each sentence aloud. This will ensure that they look at every word and is an extremely useful technique for finding punctuation errors. This will also provide an opportunity to explain any new vocabulary to your child. Do not assume that s/he understands all the words just because s/he can read them aloud. If your child needs to improve her/ his vocabulary, you might like to buy a copy of Better Tuition's Word Power Vocabulary Workbook.
4. If your child has difficulty in finding the spelling errors, ask her/ him to shade each word with a highlighter or pencil. This will encourage more careful examination of each word.
5. Another extremely useful strategy is to ask your child to write out the whole sentence, preferably just above or below the printed version. When they check their handwritten version against the printed version, they will very often find that they have unconsciously corrected any misspellings and/ or punctuation errors.
6. Mark your child's work straight away. If s/he has failed to find any spelling errors, s/he should write the corrected spellings out three times, then write a sentence using the corrected words. You might like to keep a record of these words and test your child on them at the end of the week.
7. If s/he has failed to find any punctuation errors, you will need to establish whether there is a lack of understanding or a lack of attention to detail. When new punctuation (e.g. the semi-colon) is introduced, your child should practise punctuating with it in three sentences. Reading aloud from a variety of texts will be helpful in improving your child's awareness of punctuation rules.
